After multiple information events, question and answer sessions, formal and informal conversations, architectural consultations and strategic planning meetings, the congregation has overwhelmingly approved moving forward with a building expansion. In fact, 96% of those voting affirmed moving forward with the \$560,000 expansion project, easily exceeding the constitutional requirements necessary for such a project to proceed. The project now moves into the fundraising and bid securement phase as details begin to finalize and the sequence of construction events begins to come into clearer focus.

Breaking Down The Cost

A half of a million dollars seems like a lot of money, yet in reality, if our families each give just bit more (less than \$9.00 of additional giving each week) we can easily pay the project off in 5 years! While we will get into the specifics of funding more in the coming weeks, please just know this is a very accessible addition for a congregation of our health and size, and it is certainly accomplishable with God's help and blessing!

Plans for three special offerings which will help reduce any funds we might need to borrow are set, with the first occurring on November 18, 2018 (for those of you who like to plan ahead)! In fact, if each person who voted for the project were able to give a one time gift of \$1,970 on that day the entire project would be paid for in a single day!

Who knows what God has in store in the coming weeks? Whatever God's plan, we trust that God will provide what is needed and we look forward to the opportunity to join with God in this expansion!

BUT... WHAT ABOUT COURAGE?

I have adopted yet another personal verbal prohibition. My latest phrase to be flushed is, "Be safe."

My own mother said it to me, though she actually said, "Be careful," whenever I left the house. I really hadn't thought much about it at all until a commercial aired wherein a race driver donned his helmet to ride in a golf cart. His reply to an incredulous onlooker — "Hey, safety first!" I felt irritated but wasn't sure why.

Perhaps part of it was my upbringing. Cars had no seatbelts then; I rode in the seat, on the floor, across the seat, up in the back window (not much), even in the FRONT seat (Horror of horrors!), learning to shift gears at my mother's side (a useful skill for our future Bronco). I was free to improvise and imagine. When we bought an automobile that <u>did</u> have seatbelts, I imagined I was on an airplane.

These are commonly used words, nothing inherently bad, but their recurrent use reflects a culture obsessed with safety, almost to the extent that we can barely move without a warning label. Do I desire safety for my kids? For my grand-kids? Of course I do, and will go to great lengths to ensure it. Am I talking out of both sides of my mouth? Of course I am; I'm still sorting it out.

And yet... I remain irritated and I think I'm beginning to understand why. My mind keeps returning to the following (albeit a bit out of context).

While people are saying, "Peace and safety," destruction will come on them suddenly, as labor pains on a pregnant woman, and they will not escape.

Few who have made a difference have played it safe. Simply look to Scripture for examples. David made difference when he faced the giant. Gideon made a difference when he obeyed the Lord in spite of his fear, facing the Midianites with a mere 300 men. And Christ – where would we be had our Lord Jesus Christ played the safety card? (Fortunately, that's not who He is, but I digress.)

We are about to celebrate the 242nd anniversary of our nation's independence. It took courageous individuals to stand for liberty when it would have been safer to remain unobtrusive. Courageous men and women have fought and died to ensure the freedom of future generations. They didn't play it safe.

Josiah climbed 8 feet up our chimney. (My grandson, not the king.) He didn't play it safe (as he gave his mom a coronary).


